


EUTR Due Diligence Activity Autumn 2017

The purpose of this activity is to help you to familiarise yourself with the tools and resources available on the Sourcing Hub.

This may include how these resources could assist:

- an operator to conduct due diligence
- an enforcement officer of a Competent Authority to evaluate the due diligence system implemented by an operator.



- Case study of an operator sourcing from China and elsewhere.
- Fictitious (but based on real scenarios).
- Requires consultation of Sourcing Hub.
- Three parts, requiring:
 - Group work
 - Presentation of findings
 - Discussion/feedback.



- You are an Enforcement Officer for a Competent Authority. You have been assigned an Operator to inspect.
- You have scheduled a date to visit the Operator and requested to that they send you their DDS in advance.
- Work in small groups to evaluate key elements of the DDS implemented by the Operator.
- Each part of the activity addresses a different element of the DDS.

Getting started: Review of DDS procedures & supply chain mapping

45 mins total (30 minutes preparation and work, 15 minutes presentation and discussion)



- 1. Read the information provided to you by the Operator:
 - Email
 - DDS procedures manual
 - Supplier management form (TR-05)
- 2. Note where you see any **significant gaps** in the DDS documented procedures.

3. Prepare a **supply chain map** based on the information provided.

Be ready to discuss your initial findings with the whole class


- No system of internal monitoring.
- No Complaints procedure
- No definition of **Scope**: products and supply chains are included within the scope of the DDS.
- Are there Chain of Custody / segregation procedures?
- No information on Evaluating Documents and Information. How documents and information are evaluated to identify if information is lacking about a product, or if information is inadequate to enable effective risk assessment.





- Procedures to ensure changes to supply chains shall be communicated, prior to sale of any products.
- Risk assessment does not appear to cover trade and transport in the country of harvest.
- No mention of sanctions on timber imports or exports by the UN Security Council or the Council of the European Union;
- No procedures to evaluate Certification schemes for their credibility and completeness.
- Not clear what is the content of the Risk Mitigation Action Plan.
- Supplier consent for providing info for due diligence / supplier auditing.
- Procedures in relation to supplier verification audits

Risk Identification & Preparation for onsite visit

60 mins (40 minutes preparation and work, 20 minutes presentation and discussion).



In your group, complete an initial evaluation of the Operator's due diligence for a product. Each group will focus on one product:

- Group 1 = Storage box
- Group 2 = Bedside table
- Group 3 = Dining table

NOTE: If time allows, please feel free to select additional products.



Risk identification

- 1. Evaluate the (limited) supply chain information and risk description contained in the simplified Supplier Management Form.
- 2. Decide whether the level of information is satisfactory for:
 - Product type
 - Species
 - Origin of the material
- 3. Evaluate/conclude if the risk assessment conclusions and justifications are appropriate.
- 4. [OPTIONAL] Prepare your own risk description (and justification) for one of the supply chains. The tool DD-08 Risk Identification Checklist provides a comprehensive list of topics/questions for doing this.



Preparation for the on-site visit

- 5. Prepare a set of questions you would like to ask the Operator during the onsite visit.
- 6. Decide which member of your group will lead the onsite visit and/or divide topics and questions among team-members.

Risk specification and mitigation

105 mins (60 minutes preparation and work, 45 minutes presentation and discussion)

Be ready to present a summary of your findings above, with the whole class.



- 1. Which specific risks apply to the supply chain you have evaluated?
- 2. Which of these risks are addressed by the Risk Mitigation Action implemented/proposed by the operator?
- 3. Do you consider the Risk Mitigation Action implemented/proposed by the operator has/will mitigated the risks?
 - a) Consider actual/possible weaknesses in the Risk Mitigation Action implemented by the company.
- 4. Can your group consider any alternative, effective, Risk Mitigation Actions that may be worth considering?

Risk specification and mitigation

60 mins. 40 minutes preparation and work, 20 minutes presentations and discussion.



- 1. Risk specification mixing of material from other origins in the supply chain
 - a) Select one supply chain and consider where the principle mixing risks lie. See `Supply chain complexity in DD-08 Risk identification checklist.
- 1. Risk specification forest level
 - Review the country pages and national risk assessments for China and the Democratic Republic of the Congo, which can be downloaded from the NEPCon Sourcing Hub.
 - b) Develop an overview of risks associated with **one sourcing country** and **one category of law**
- 3. Risk mitigation
 - a) Pick two of the risks that were specified in the risk assessment and consider how they affect your supply chain(s).
 - b) Evaluate options for mitigating the specified risks and select risk mitigating actions you would choose to establish, considering effectiveness and cost efficiency.
